A Level History

History at A level invites students to delve deeper into, and ask questions of, events which have shaped the world we live in today: How did the execution of King Charles I influence the way parliament is run today? Was revolution in Russia inevitable? How did the USA go from slavery to its first black president in less than 150 years? In history, students have the opportunity to discuss, debate and analyse questions such as these, whilst also developing important transferable skills such as formulating arguments and critical thinking.
